BEAVERS



- 1. What does a beaver use its tail for?
- 2. Why do beavers have such big front teeth?
- 3. What do beavers eat?
- 4. How do beavers cut down trees? Move large logs?
- 5. How do beavers build dams? Why do they build them?
- 6. Explain how a beaver's home is made?
- 7. Build a beaver dam using small sticks and glue or build a beaver lodge.
- 8. Read a story about beavers, their families, and how parent beavers protect their young.
- 9. How many babies does a mother beaver have? How soon after birth can baby beavers swim?
- 10. Draw or color a picture of what a beaver's lodge looks like if you could slice off one side of a typical beaver lodge.

Helps:

- 1. Their flat tail slaps the water, to let other beaver know where they are, where food is. They also slap their tails to alert other beavers of danger.
- 2. They can chew or gnaw on tree trunks
- 3. <u>Beavers</u> eat leaves, bark, twigs, roots, and aquatic plants
- 4. Their sharp front teeth and cut big logs into branches or twigs
- 5. When the trees fall down and they build lodges and dams to live in
- 6. Small leaves twigs and mud
- 9. Two to four babies each year and a baby beaver can swim almost right after its birth
