- 2. What do backpackers do to protect their matches from water?
- 3. What did your great-grandparents use matches for?
- 4. How do you use matches in your home and yard?
- 5. Learn four (4) basic rules concerning matches.
- 6. Collect (20) match boxes.
- 7. Share with the group where your favorite match boxes come from.
- 8. Trade match boxes with your friends to obtain a variety.
- 9. Neatly organize your match boxes in a display.
- 10. Display your collection at an Adventurer meeting or youth fair.



HELPS:

- 1. Matches were first used
- 2. Show, if possible, the metal container and wax covered matches that back packers use to protect their matches from water.
- 3. Possible uses: Lantern, candles, lighting cook stove or fireplace fire, burning trash or tree branches in the fields or yards, heating water, making soap, maple syrup, etc.
- 4. Lighting a camping lantern, table candles, fireplace, outdoor barbecue, campfire, etc.
- 5. a. Never strike a match without permission
 - b. never play with matches or fire
 - c. Do not carry matches without permission
 - d. Do not light a campfire, fireplace, fireplace, barbecue, etc., without adult supervision
- 6. Collect a variety with no two alike.
- 7. Give the child a time to share his/her collection by telling about a few favorites.
- 8. Plan a trade time where children may learn to fairly share in trading one for one. Never force a child to give up a favorite.
- 9. & 10. Neatly organize and display the collection, teaching the child to care for the child to care for, and put away, away, their own things.
